Congratulations to Boise State team Heuristic Heretics members **Jake Blow**, **Justin Weaver**, and **Daniel Butler** for their outstanding performance in this year's IEEEExtreme competition—a global challenge in which teams of IEEE student members, supported by an IEEE student branch, advised and proctored by IEEE members, compete in a 24-hour time span against each other to solve a set of programming problems.

All three team members are Juniors majoring in Computer Science and members of the BSU IEEE Student Branch. They finished 33rd out of 238 teams participating in the U.S., and 264th out of 1760 teams participating worldwide. We would like to thank the IEEE volunteers who proctored at the event and hope to see even more local teams compete next year.



Three Electrical Engineering Students Awarded National Scholarships

Three electrical and computer engineering (ECE) students have been awarded scholarships by the IEEE Power and Energy Society (PES). **Carl Barcroft**, **Cody Breckenridge** and **Shaun Stevens** were among 184 students selected from 95 universities across the United States and Canada for the 2014-2015 academic year. These scholarship recipients have achieved outstanding academic records while balancing other commitments. Carl Barcroft is a junior electrical engineering student minoring in physics and applied mathematics. He has been a part of the NASA Microgravity University program as well as Sodium-Ion battery research under Dr. Xiong at Boise State University. He is IEEE Student Branch Chair at BSU and works part time as an instructor at a hands-on STEM education lab called PCS Edventures. The lab is for youth ages 9-17 and covers all fields of STEM. Cody Breckenridge is an Idaho Army National Guard member and volunteers for the Wyakin Warrior Foundation, which provides education and professional development services for severely wounded or injured veterans. Shaun Stevens is an active member of the Boise State Honors Student Association where he serves as treasurer and peer mentor to incoming freshman. He hopes to have a career which fuses power and embedded systems topics, his two favorite ECE subjects.

The IEEE PES Scholarship Plus Initiative provides multi-year scholarships and career experience opportunities to qualifying electrical engineering undergraduate students. The initiative recognizes undergraduate students who have declared a major in electrical and computer engineering, are high achievers with strong GPAs, have distinctive extracurricular commitments, and are committed to exploring the power and energy field. As long as scholars continue to meet renewal standards, recipients receive up to three years of funding—US\$2,000 the first year, \$2,000 the second year and \$3,000 the third year—interspersed with up to two years of valuable, hands-on career experience. If you are interested in becoming an IEEE Senior Member, you must meet qualifications for IEEE membership including being an engineer, scientist, educator, technical executive or originator in any IEEE-designated field. You must have been in professional practice for at least ten years and have shown significant performance over a period of at least five years. Note that educational experience is credited towards time in professional practice—three years credit if you hold a bachelor's degree, four years for a bachelor's and master's degree, and five years for a doctorate.

Information about the application process is available on the IEEE senior member website. As part of the application process, you need to identify three current senior members to serve as references. Elected Positions

- **Chair**—set spending priorities, attend Area and Region training meetings, oversee Section and Society Chapter activities, organize and run OpComm meetings every two months
- **Vice-Chair**—assist the Chair with organizing and running meetings and keeping the Section and Chapters organized
- **Secretary**—take minutes at OpComm meetings, schedule meetings using vtools and file short reports after meetings

- **Treasurer**—write a few reimbursement checks, manage the checking account, lead the budget proposal discussion at the end of the year and file a financial report at the beginning of the year

Appointed Positions

- **Membership Development Chair**—keep the e-mail distribution list up-to-date with new members, lead efforts to upgrade eligible members to Senior Members, welcome new members to IEEE
- **PACE Chair**—organize activities of interest to professional engineers such as hosting IEEE Distinguished speakers and organizing donations to K-12 STEM programs

It's time to start considering what you will present at the **2015 IEEE Workshop on Microelectronics and Electron Devices** to be held March 20, 2015 at the Boise State University Student Union Building. This thirteenth annual workshop will provide a forum for reviewing and discussing all aspects of microelectronics including semiconductor processing, electrical characterization, advanced design, and new device technologies. The workshop consists of invited and contributed talks, papers, tutorials and a poster session throughout the day.

Attendance continues to grow, so take advantage of this great opportunity to share your work with engineers and technologists from all around the region. The WMED invites Micron/JDP/JV team members to contribute papers on either completed research or "work-in-progress." Topics in the following areas will form the contributing sessions and poster session of the workshop program:

- Microelectronic device processing and process integration
- Emerging memories and material systems
- Novel device technology and reliability
- Circuit design, device modeling and simulation
- Semiconductor packaging and reliability
- Optoelectronic devices, displays, sensors and MEMS

All accepted manuscripts will be indexed in the IEEE Xplore database. A USB Flash Drive including the papers and presentations is planned and will be available at the start of the workshop. A template containing [manuscript preparation instructions](#) can be downloaded.

Submit your IEEE-formatted manuscript (up to 4 pages) by Jan. 9, 2015 to the WMED Publications Chair, Kamal Muthukrishnan (kmuthukrishn@micron.com, +1 208-363-5214). The Technical Program Committee will have a peer-review process to meet the IEEE criterion for minimum standards of quality (details on the website). 2014 IEEE Sections Congress

This past August, IEEE Boise Section Vice Chair Sean Collison attended IEEE Sections Congress in Amsterdam, Netherlands. IEEE Sections Congress is a triennial gathering of IEEE grassroots leadership to network with other Section Leaders, attend training programs, and develop recommendations to guide the future of IEEE. This year's Sections Congress was the first one held outside of the United States. At Sections Congress, numerous presentations focused on enhancing member satisfaction, improving volunteer experience within the section, and reaching globally with a local touch. These presentations were given in the form of standard breakout sessions, learning labs—where a 10-15 minute live demonstration of an IEEE application is given, and a new format called an Ignite session, which was a five-minute presentation intended to spark interest in a particular topic. Some memorable sessions from the event include a breakout session entitled, Developing Your Networking Skills, given by Gary Blank, IEEE USA President. Before each IEEE Sections Congress, section leaders propose a multitude of recommendations for the future direction of IEEE. These proposals are voted on during Sections Congress and the top 5

chosen to be implemented in the next few years. These five recommendations received the most votes at the 2014 event:

- Include free access to the IEEE [Xplore] Digital Library as a member benefit. Promote other IEEE services and products based on their usage and preferences (adopt Google Business Model).
- Develop an incentive and recognition program for companies that invest in full or partial support of their employees' IEEE membership dues.
- Introduce loyalty rewards such as publication access, conference fees, and standards for continued membership.
- Provide a tool to build, promote, record, host, and broadcast technical events at the local level and make them available to IEEE members.
- Enhance vTools for better usability by volunteers and provide a training program to the sections. [vTools are developed and made possible by IEEE volunteers. The toolbox simplifies administration by offering Web-based software, reduces time spent managing activities, and assists in member development.]
